he first day of flying is always stressful because you don't know what your static score is until you post your first flight score to get an idea of how you are going to place overall in the contest. When you know your static score and your first flight score, you start to figure out how to recover from any point differences in the overall contest.

The weather was good in the morning Saturday but proved to be too windy to fly round 2 for some people. The majority of the pilots chose not to fly in round 2 because of the wind, so we were done by noon. The wind did cause one 1/2A model to crash, and the air was bumpy, even for my 14-pound B-29.

Pete Klepsic flew his Brodak B-25 aircraft that had throttle, flaps, and a bomb drop, and it did very well. The kit that Pete built the model from is available from Brodak Manufacturing, which by the way, sponsored many of the awards that are given out at the Nationals.

Pete was able to install the bomb drop unit into the profile fuselage. Just because the aircraft is a profile doesn't mean you have to skimp on the operational details. Retracts are even possible with profile models. On Saturday night we had the Scale banquet to award the High Static awards and some other special honors. Charlie Bauer posthumously received the Lifetime Achievement Award, and it was accepted by his wife, Judith. The following Top Static Awards were handed out:

ay 2 for RC Pylon is AMA 424. "Sport Quickie" as we know it, uses the "Quickie" style airframe with a sport .40-size motor. Thunder Tiger and Evolution are the name of the game. Pick your poison.

The field was evenly split between motors. This year, all pilots were allowed to join in on the 424 fun. There were Expert and Standard classes within the overall race. If a pilot called himself or herself an expert, could fly in 422 or fly faster than 1:29.00, he or she was considered Expert. All others were in the Standard class.

Because these motors are evenly matched, there was a lot of *close* and *tight* racing. Every heat was highly contested.

Again Saturday, the conditions were a blue sky and *windy*. Takeoffs and corners were a challenge. At the end of the day, when the dust settled, there were several flyoffs to determine the final standings. In the Standard class, Daniel Troup came out on top. And in the Expert class, Duane Hulen was perfect for the day.
